Dear Parents and Carers

This term has been filled with wonderful activities and Christmas joy. These activities form part of our broader goal to provide children with the most rounded school experience possible, one that fills them with cultural capital, enjoyment in their learning, and the academic skills they need to be successful in the future.

It was a pleasure to spend time with our year 6 pupils as they embarked on one of the biggest adventures of their time at the Federation: Mill on The Brue! It was a privilege to see children facing and overcoming all sorts of challenges, encouraging each other, and needing to really draw on their resilience and courage. We are all really proud of everything they achieved on camp and hope that, in the future, the memories made will remind them that anything is possible when you step out of your comfort zone and believe in yourself! Year 5 can look forward to similar excitement at the residential to Charterhouse later this academic year. Other highlights have included Folly Farm and the Bristol pantomime. We have a superb calendar of trips and enrichment opportunities and look forward to sharing many more with the children throughout the year.

A personal highlight this term has been giving out the first of our 'presentation pouches'. These are the highest award available in school for presentation. Children are presented with these in celebration assembly and their coveted blue velvet pouch becomes a source of pride to show-case as role models for expectations and standards in their work. These can be awarded to any-one and, crucially, they are not about perfection. The standard needed to earn a presentation pouch is to take the best care that you possibly can to show pride in your work. Anyone can be awarded these for showing care and consistency in all that they do – children value these enormously and I hope to present many more throughout the year.

At the heart of everything we do in our Federation is a commitment to continually improve teaching and learning. This year, we are focusing on developing a consistent approach to pedagogy across the school, ensuring that every child receives the best possible teaching in a supportive environment where risk-taking in learning is encouraged. This can only happen when children feel safe to take those risks, knowing that they will be supported through those moments of challenge by the strong relationships with teachers that underpin everything. This builds on the fantastic work we've already done around growth mindset and embracing "marvellous mistakes," where we celebrate learning through effort and perseverance.



We are excited about our upcoming Inset day in January, where teachers will be participating in a training session focused on maths. This will support them in further enhancing their ability to help children to tackle challenge in their learning, particularly in areas where they may need extra support or extension. Please note that both schools will be closed for this on Monday 6th January and the first day back for pupils is Tuesday 7th January.

Looking ahead to the next term, we will be introducing a whole-school value for the term— 'respect'—which we believe underpins our approach to building and sustaining positive relationships and behaviour across the school. We are committed to nurturing a school culture where mutual respect and kindness are at the forefront of everything we do, for both children and adults. Following this, I am thrilled to inform you that the Federation School Council will be working closely with our leaders in the new year to draft new values for each year group across the school. This collaborative effort will help to ensure that the values we teach align with the needs and desires of the children in our care. In this, the children have an opportunity to shape the next steps in our vision together, which puts them and their opinions rightly at the forefront of our approach.

Finally, as we approach the end of a busy and festive term, I wanted to take this opportunity to wish you all a very Merry Christmas. It has been a term filled with joy, hard work, and celebration. We are so proud of all the children for all that they have achieved so far this year and look forward to sharing further successes with you throughout the year.




CHINCHILLAS

This term, Chinchillas have had a lot of fun learning how to draw parts of our faces using mirrors to help us. It was very tricky but we persevered and tried to replicate the other half of our faces using pencil and a black and white photo. Here are a few examples:







We then tried to look at how to sketch bodies in different positions. We used oval shapes to get the proportions right.

Later in the term, we had an exciting trip to Cheddar. We met a woman from the stone age and she showed us how to use flint to light a fire. The caves were full of lights ready for Christmas. Some were very big and others tiny but despite trying to stay quiet(!!!), we didn't see any bats! Before leaving, we got to see some more goats clambering the hills and try some cave aged cheddar cheese! It was very strong!!

Attendance

Attendance really matters; a pupil who has attendance below 90% (classed as persistently absent by the government standard) misses 4 school weeks a year. We aim for the best attendance possible and for all pupils to be at 96% attendance, and above, throughout the course of the year. For those who dip below that number, we work with families to understand context and challenges in order to establish whether there are any actions that school or other agencies can put in place to help their child's attendance to improve.

As much as possible, we try to speak with families directly. Throughout the year, we also inform parents where children move below these percentages through letters, in line with the LSP policy for managing attendance. In all circumstances, our pastoral team are always here to listen and help. We understand that sometimes children are unwell and need to stay at home. However, often there are also further actions that, when shared, can enable us to put more support in place.

Finally, please be reminded that, during the summer there were changes to the national approach to school attendance and subsequent changes to our trust-wide attendance policy, which applies to all schools within the Lighthouse Schools Partnership (LSP). This specifically affects requests for term-time absence.
